A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR DANI:

Have you ever read the genealogy of Christ in its entirety? Many of us skip over genealogies in scripture because we are simply unsure of the pronunciation of most ancient names and towns. But if we skip genealogies, we inevitably skip the rich histories and the stories that make up God's people.

Like all of us, Jesus came from a unique family tree filled with complicated stories and awful mistakes. How many of you have spent time working with your own personal ancestry in order to figure out where you come from? We are a people who enjoy making meaning of our lives and of the lives that came before us. Like all of us, Jesus comes from a line of *saints* and *scoundrels*.

The gospels of Matthew and Luke both include their own genealogies of Jesus, tracing his lineage back to Israel's beginnings. We can choose to ignore his genealogy due to difficult pronunciation, or we can spend time getting to know who makes up his family tree and how incredibly *human* his ancestors were. With the help of Genesis, Ruth, 2 Samuel, and the genealogies in Matthew & Luke, we'll recall a few of the significant stories and major figures in Christ's family tree during worship this May.

Jesus' lineage doesn't just teach us that his ancestry ties with the people of Israel. We also learn to discover from whom Jesus comes. He is born within a long line of people who made mistakes, struggled in relationships, and needed God's love along the way. Perhaps we can learn a thing or two from the ancient stories of Jesus' ancestors who lived imperfectly. And maybe we'll also discover how biology isn't the only essential part of what it means to be "family."

Where we come from matters – but what we do with the stories that make us matters even more. Let's discover Jesus' roots as they inform us about our own.

News from our Iowa Annual Conference:

The lowa Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church has been in conversation for years with the global denomination & local churches on how to move forward & live faithfully in the midst of denominational tension around LGBTQ+ weddings & ordinations.

Perhaps you've heard about new Methodist denominations or conversations occurring in recent weeks or years.

The Global Methodist Church is a new denomination forming currently as the United Methodist denomination continues to debate. Our Annual Conference in lowa recently created new policies that you might be interested in learning more about. These new policies do not affect our local church as our Administrative Council at Ivy Centennial has not made any decisions or voted on any changes.

However, some neighboring United Methodist churches in Iowa are changing their policies on LGBTQ+ weddings in their local congregation since the release of their new Vision. You can read the statement published by the Iowa Annual Conference below.

"The Iowa Annual Conference Appointive Cabinet and Bishop Laurie Haller, in consultation, conversation, and collaboration with a representative body of Iowa United Methodist traditional, centrist, and progressive compatibilists, the Ezekiel Team, and our Conference Boards of Trustees, Pensions, and Finance and Administration (CFA), offer a new way forward as we live into the future of the Iowa Annual Conference. This way forward is informed by Bishop Laurie's "Vision 2032," where (1) relationships are more important than theological convictions, (2) innovation, creativity, and imagination are more important than stagnation, rigidity, sacred cows, and the status quo, and (3) our primary focus is on the Great Commission and the Great Commandment.

Many forces press against United Methodist Congregations including a global pandemic, new iterations of Methodism desiring to move forward, and the repeated delay of General Conference 2020. We boldly offer this vision and plan for how we will live, lead, and do ministry now as United Methodists in the Iowa

Annual Conference...

As we lead now into the future, we desire to equip local congregations to do the ministry God is calling them to do. No one will be compelled or required to act contrary to their convictions, understanding of scripture, or conscience. Likewise, no one will be prevented from doing the ministry God is calling them to offer. To put it clearly, pastors will be able to choose which weddings they officiate, as long as it is two consenting adults who have been counseled. Likewise, church leadership, in consultation with their pastors, will be able to determine their own policy regarding weddings. Our ministry and witness to the world is stronger due to our connection. We will live into the trust we have in one another knowing our congregations and clergy are deeply engaged and informed by scripture, are convicted by the Holy Spirit, and are being responsible to the mission God has called us to – even when we don't all agree, or our ministries are different...

We realize this vision may go too far for some in the current Iowa Annual Conference and not far enough for others. For many congregations this means that nothing will change regarding the way you operate or do ministry. No vote needs to be taken. Nor do changes need to be made in your local context. Keep doing what God is calling you to do. For some congregations, this means that you will now be free to begin new ministries that God is calling you to do."
